

**PTE. JOHN JELLIS KILLED.**

Eight long months of suspense has been the anxious lot of Mrs. Jellis, who last September was notified that her husband was missing. He joined the Bedfordshire Regiment in November, 1915, and after five months' service in France was reported missing. No news of any description followed till a week or two ago, when Mrs. Jellis received an official notification that he was killed in action on September 15th. Prior to joining the Colours Pte. Jellis was employed at the Gas Works, Luton.

**PTE. ARTHUR EAMES MISSING.**

"Missing" on April 29th is the anxious notification received by Miss Eames, the sister of Pte. Arthur Eames. He was 31 years old and joined the Bedfordshire Regiment in December, 1914. He saw two years' service in France, and was wounded once last July. Miss Eames would be glad to receive any information respecting her brother. She resides at Slate Hall, Sundon.

At the outbreak of war Pte. T. Eames, brother to Pte. A. Eames, enlisted in the Bedfordshire Regiment. For 16 months he was in France, and was wounded last November in the arm. The injury was of such a serious nature that it necessitated having his arm amputated from just above the elbow. He is now home, but has not yet received his discharge. He is awaiting admission to Roehampton Hospital to procure an artificial arm.

**PTE. GEORGE HULL KILLED.**

Mrs. J. Hull, no relation to the Hull family previously mentioned, has been the recipient of many official notifications from Warley and the War Office with regard to her son's fate. Pte. George Hull, who was 28 years old, was first of all reported as "missing" between April 9th and 12th. It has since been ascertained that he was killed between the dates mentioned. Enlisting in the Bedfordshire Regiment at the outbreak of war, he was in France for 13 months. He was then taken ill with pleurisy and diffusion, and was a patient at an Eastbourne hospital for three months. He returned to his regiment in France last January.

**PTE. FRANK HULL.**

Pte. Frank Hull, of the Sherwood Foresters, brother to the above, joined the Army in January, 1916, and was shortly afterwards sent over to Ireland, participating in the Irish Rebellion. He was wounded during that time in the arm. Proceeding to France, he was given work on the railway out there, but has now rejoined his regiment.
